The festival is part of European project, Performing Gender: Dancing in Your Shoes which works with partners and communities across 8 countries. Performing Gender is supported by Creative Europe. The project holds the firm belief that gender, sexuality and LGBTQIA+ identities can be explored through dance and local community engagement.





#### Festival Venues and Travel

Festival events take place at Yorkshire Dance with a headline Double Bill performance at Leeds Playhouse as part of their Open Season.

Yorkshire Dance and Leeds Playhouse are just a 2-minute walk from each other and are both located in the cultural quarter of Leeds city centre. Yorkshire Dance is opposite BBC Yorkshire and Leeds Conservatoire. Leeds Playhouse is directly opposite Leeds Bus Station.

Both venues are a 2-minute walk from Leeds city centre bus station and a 15 minute walk from Leeds train station.

There is limited on-street parking available for Blue Badge holders on St Peter's Square. There is also car parking available nearby at Victoria Gate in Leeds.

Friday 7 July, 19:00 - 20:30 Studio 3. Yorkshire Dance



Taking Space, facilitated by Laura Kumin, is a relaxed talk, exploring questions around coproduction, power and identity.

Hear from the artists and communities involved in the Performing Gender: Dancing in Your Shoes project, as they discuss their experiences of creating dance together, building empathy and understanding within a group and how personal stories and identities shape a choreographic process.

Inviting in broader perspectives from auest artists. Jo Fona and Dee Rogers, the talk will explore how to dismantle hierarchy in creative processes, what the challenges are when shifting from process to performance and how to redefine our expectations of community dance practices.

We warmly invite you to join us, to share your experiences and to meet some of our local and international guests.

Eight people are searching for the ways and the words to share their stories and find a collective voice.

Connected by their Former **Dutch East Indies and Moluccan** roots, but different in how they express themselves, the performers reflect on their experiences as a minority in the Netherlands. Both fragmented and united, they overcome the silence to create a new understanding with each other and their audience.

# Express Yourself with Ágnes Grélinger

Sat 8 July, 9:30-11:00 Studio 3, Yorkshire Dance

In this guided workshop, participants are invited to connect to themselves and others, and discover inner depths.

Ágnes will lead the group in celebrating the parts of our identity that we sometimes keep hidden, in a safe, fun and gentle environment. Participants can expect playful tasks involving music and clothing with the opportunity to embrace the diversity of our human experience.

Workshop Landing on Feathers with Jija Sohn Sat 8 July, 9:30 - 11:00 Studio 1, Yorkshire Dance Join us for this participative workshop with Dutch artist Jija Sohn. Jija will lead a refreshing morning warm-up before introducing a short film of her project Landing on Feathers. In 2021 Jija Sohn, Alexandra Lemm, Nica Roses & Julia Reist began a research project with visual artist Elmer Kouwenberg, who was paralysed in a car accident 28 years ago. This research resulted in Landing on Feathers, a poetic short film exploring the relationship between ability and disability, care-giver and care-receiver and asking where self-care fits into these dichotomies.

The film is followed by a physical 'conversation' as Jija leads simple and playful exercises to reflect on and question the themes within the film.



Kingdom of the Netherlands


Sat 8 July, 11:30-13:30 Studio 3, Yorkshire Dance

What if we could start the day addressing our needs, desires and intentions?

What if it was a priority to care for ourselves as it is for the ones around us, finding out together what serves both the individual and the collective body?

In the first part of the workshop, participants will tune into their bodies' wisdom through somatic practices, visualisation and guided movement. In the second part we address our individual needs through creative exercises.

Collective Self-Care is a group experience to allow creativity to move through the body with ease, so we can move through the world with more grace, confidence and joy. We are practicing the creation of safe, conscious and consensual spaces to enhance our imagination of what is possible.



Feeling different and being seen as different is a complicated business. It can be exciting, distressing, temporary, permanent, liberating, advantageous, dangerous and a cause for celebration.

Join Jo Fong and Dee Rogers for a workshop based on their new work 'A Brief History of Difference'.

Jo and Dee invite you to join them in considering some tricky questions around the subjects of difference, identity, positioning and belonging.

In this workshop we will move, share, listen, play, be curious and keep in mind that our key questions will, most likely, remain unsolved and that's ok!

'A Brief History of Difference' is an interactive theatre performance rooted in conversation, knowledge sharing, questioning and personal narrative. It seeks to open up new ways of thinking about and experiencing what it means to be different and to find a sense of belonging as a person of difference.

Netherlands based Artist Jija Sohn returns to Leeds to reconnect with House of Flava, a Queer, Trans, Intersex, Black & People of Colour community, to share their experiences of working together.

We invite you to join a workshop centring around care and community. Asking how we can hold space for our own bodies as well as others and examining the ways the body leaves traces behind, revealing where it has been and where it is going.

Following the workshop join Jija Sohn, Bakani Pick-Up and House of Flava members for a 'Living Library'. At the entrance, instead of books, you will find people available for one-on-one conversation to reflect on the Performing Gender project, sharing their knowledge or their life story.



Nobody Whistles Anymore was created by City of Women Festival's newly formed Company. The Company, aged 27-74, were all new to dance and theatre and ioin us from Ljubljana, Slovenia to share their new work, devised through workshops led by theatre director Brina Klampfer and choreographer Vita Osojnik.





'Epic Stories of Our Everyday' by TC Howard and Company of People (with dance artists Kate Cox, Izzy Brittain and Bakani Pick-Up)

'We are guided by the invisible bonds that connect us. Bonds born out of curiosity and play and freedom to be 'other'. We are an unlikely and beautiful mixed community of ages, cultures and identities finding the humour, pride and ownership of who we are and how we live.'

Following in the footsteps of Company of People's previous work, epic stories of everyday lives are at the heart of this new performance which exposes intimate details and elevates 'everyday' culture, literature and history to the grandeur of high art.

Company of People is an intergenerational group rooted in the communities of Chapeltown and Harehills in Leeds. The group


worked collaboratively with choreographer TC Howard to create Epic Stories of Our Everyday.

These performances are followed by a 45-minute postshow discussion, inviting in reflections from the audience, artists and performers about co-creation, identity and creative risk taking.

Lets Dance! with Fresh Junk Arts


Sat 8 July, 19:30 – 22:30 Studio 3, Yorkshire Dance
